OUR MISSION STATEMENT

KONOS Academy provides a classically rich curriculum, which engages students to think and speak from a biblical worldview in a manner that glorifies God.

THE GENESIS OF KONOS ACADEMY

After meeting at L'Abri and marrying in 1971, Charles and Carole Thaxton incorporated KONOS, Inc. as a teaching, training, counseling center in Cambridge, Massachusetts. After moving to Dallas, where Charles worked with Probe Ministries, the Thaxtons resolved to teach their own children according to the KONOS model of incorporating academic subjects within a character development framework and called their home-school KONOS Academy. Carole Thaxton and Jessica Hulcy co-authored the popular KONOS CURRICULUM unit studies. While teaching and counseling at the Julian Center in Julian, California, Charles continued to speak to thousands of university students throughout the world. Meanwhile, Carole spoke at hundreds of conferences about how to teach the KONOS way while teaching their own children and leading home-school co-ops. Charles' first book The Mystery of Life's Origin (Thaxton, Bradley, Olsen) was translated into Romanian in 1986, which led to his grand entrance into the university lecture halls of Romania after their revolution. Translation of The Mystery of Life's Origin and later The Soul of Science (co-authored with Nancy Pearcey) into several Eastern European languages, led to extensive travel throughout Eastern Europe. The Thaxton family decided to reside in Prague for six years for more intensive ministry within the most atheistic country in Europe -- the Czech Republic. Carole's forte of education and counseling prepared her not only for home-schooling their own sons but also in founding the KONOS ACADEMY OF PRAGUE, an Englishspeaking biblical worldview school, and for counseling English-speaking families living abroad on parenting and education issues. After Charles' radical cancer and subsequent amputation, the Thaxtons moved to Fayetteville, GA, and began KONOS Academy in 2001.

THE MEANING OF KONOS

KONOS is a concept of education based upon theistic principles. This means that we teach God exists and has very practical effects upon this world. The word "KONOS" is the Greek word for "cone" representing a biblical worldview. The inverted cone symbolizes God at the top of all life, not just "religious" life. His influence is seen both in creation (natural and physical sciences, geography, mathematical principles) and in His design of humans (philosophy, history, art, music, literature, technology, and law). Therefore, to be well educated means to understand these subjects through a biblical lens.

THE DISTINCTIVES OF KONOS ACADEMY

Classic curriculum

KONOS provides a classical education. This is not limited to the Graeco-Roman classical period or the trivium/quadrivium curriculum (based upon a Platonic model rather than a biblical model). We use the term "classical" to refer to that which is true, good, and beautiful from God's perspective. With the Bible as the benchmark of truth, goodness, and beauty, there is a higher standard by which to evaluate all human works and toward which to strive. We choose to study time-proven works, read excellent literature, listen to classically appreciated music, observe fine art, and learn from admirable people. High standards of skills and conduct are upheld for students to emulate. Students like learning at KONOS because of its hands-on, experiential, challenging, funfilled activities, which supplement their classical education.

Coordinating with parents

We agree that parents are the primary educators (i.e., trainers, mentors, nurturers, counselors, shepherds, disciplers) of their own children. Within this broad goal, they select the best avenue of education for each of their children. One option for schooling their children is the one-day program of KONOS Academy (including KONOS Kidlets, Kids, and Juniors). We aim to be very clear about our distinctives before a student is enrolled so that parents know what they are purchasing. Parents are informed on a weekly basis of student requirements.

Coordinated context

KONOS teaches the "big picture." KONOS students understand that God exists and has communicated to this world, which establishes a framework for all subjects. Subjects are organized around thematic units so that history, art, music, literature, and English composition are all related to the same basic theme.

Captivating experiences

No matter how broad the context, no matter how well integrated the curriculum, no matter how true the material, it is not "digested" by the student if it does not captivate his interest. God created people to be (active), not just to receive (passive). One KONOS goal is to create a love of learning and to insure that students really learn, not just cover, what is presented. KONOS activities absorb the student's interest and immerse him in a topic. Even high school students learn best and remember more from experiential activities.

Challenging self-learning

KONOS Academy exists for more than entertaining and informing students. We want students to inquire on their own, to find answers to questions, to come up with creative solutions, to seek to learn more. KONOS challenges students by giving them the responsibility of problem solving. This sometimes requires "gags and handcuffs" for us teachers who love to show and explain what we know.

Creative expression

As every teacher knows, something is not truly known until it is taught. KONOS goes beyond just "covering" material. Unless a student is able to tell it or demonstrate it to someone else, he does not truly know it. If he can communicate it using his own words, or an artistic rendition, or a drama, or a musical composition, then it is evident that he knows it. Therefore, KONOS emphasizes rhetorical/creative expression in the arts and literature. Through these creative media, he both reinforces and refines what he has learned.

Caring community

KONOS emphasizes learning in tutorials and small groups. In this relational context, students feel comfortable to explore, to ask questions, to try new things, to fail, and to excel. The teachers observe their areas of strength, weaknesses, learning styles, and interest areas. Within the context of small groups, problems are noticed and attempts are made to adapt to the student's particular needs.

Character emphasis

We want the students not only to be smart but also to be good. Of what value is intelligence without moral character? In fact, a smart criminal is more dangerous than an ignorant one. Theodore Roosevelt rightly said, "*To educate a man in mind and not in morals is to educate a menace to society*." Christian values are emphasized at KONOS Academy. Christian character is modeled and integrated throughout the academic program.

OUR CORE VALUES

- Knowing God, through Jesus Christ, and submitting to Him and His word, both as an organization and as individuals
- Desiring to give glory to Him rather than to ourselves
- Being a people of grace and love

- Recognizing that marriage consists of the union of one man and one woman. If the atmosphere or conduct within a home is counter to, or in opposition to the biblical model that KONOS teaches, KONOS reserves the right, within its sole discretion, to refuse admission of an applicant or discontinue enrollment of a student. This includes, but is not necessarily limited to, living in, condoning, or supporting sexual immorality; practicing a homosexual lifestyle or alternative gender identity; promoting such practices; or otherwise having the inability to support the moral principles of the Bible and KONOS (Lev. 20:13a; Rom. 1:21-27; Matt. 19:4-6; 1 Cor. 6:9-20).

OUR COMMUNITY

KONOS Academy is an overtly Christian community, teaching from a distinctly Christian and biblical worldview. We are a community that respects and attempts to follow God's word, the Bible. Nevertheless, it is a community open to people who do not share our belief in Jesus Christ as God (or the Apostle's Creed above). Those not holding our Christian convictions understand and accept that the teaching at KONOS will be from a historic Protestant Christian perspective. We do not discriminate on the basis of race, color, or national and ethnic origin in our admissions policies, scholarship programs, athletic, or other school sponsored programs.

OUR FAMILIES

We are here to assist and support families. A loving father-mother relationship is ideal for optimal educational achievement. We can best assist you in educating your child when there is a firm, loving home based upon biblical principles (instruction, loving correction, loving discipline, exercising self-control, honesty, integrity, etc). We encourage biblical counseling for struggling families and are happy to make referrals for you.

THE KONOS ONE-DAY CORE PROGRAMS

The one-day per week program provides a core curriculum for homeschooled students using a university model. High school students (KONOS Academy) meet one day per week on Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday from 9:00-2:45 and are then given assignments to be completed for the following week. Parents receive professional support, group activities, and an organized curriculum for the year. KONOS Academy is accredited by the Georgia Accrediting Commission (GAC).

KONOS ACADEMY (9:00-2:45) serves grades 9-12 and emphasizes a biblical worldview in both content and methods. The curriculum follows a four-year cycle of history from creation to the present. History is coordinated with pertinent literature and writing assignments, drama and speech assignments, and art and music assignments. During Year 1 (Creation to Christ), students also study psychology and career search. In Year 2 (Rome to Renaissance), they study health. In Year 3 (founding of America), students also study government. During Year 4 (20th century), students also study economics and ethics. All courses fulfill Georgia requirements for college-preparatory high school graduation. Please see www.konos.org for more information.

KONOS JUNIORS (9:15-2:45) serves grades 7-8 with a geography-based curriculum. They, too, integrate the history, culture, and literature of each country. Writing assignments are related to each country or continent. Please see www.konos.org for more information.

KONOS KIDS (9:15-2:45) serves grades 4-6 with KONOS Curriculum unit studies based on character qualities, integrating science, social studies, art, music, literature, language arts, and Bible. The day is full of content and related hands-on activities. Please see www.konos.org for more information.

KONOS KIDLETS (9:15-2:45) is a program designed by Carole Thaxton for grades 1-3 (ages 6-9). The children will meet once a week and will be instructed by two experienced teacher-moms. Meanwhile, moms will meet for 1+ hours 9:15-10:30 with Carole Thaxton for weekly support (babies and toddlers may attend). We are calling this a directed co-op. It is more than a playgroup but less than a formal program, i.e., appropriate for this age group. It is cooperative enjoyment and enrichment while absorbing new information and skills, readying them for more formal learning in KK. 2018-19 KONOS ACADEMY CORE COURSES

MEDIEVAL WORLD HISTORY: Rome to Renaissance (1 credit)

Dr. Charles Thaxton

The theme for 2018-19 is ROOTS. Using a variety of resources we will examine the roots of Western civilization, starting with Jesus Christ in the Graeco-Roman world, through the development of the early Church and expanding through Europe. Each year also reviews the big picture of history and geography. Students learn by lecture, personal research, and group presentations.

BRITISH LITERATURE AND COMPOSITION (1 credit)

English literature is coordinated with the history units. We will read and analyze a wide variety of plays, historical fiction and current works based upon the Middle Ages. Students practice vocabulary, grammar, and composition skills each week. Each student will learn and practice essay organization and structure; write analysis essays, summaries, articles, and persuasive essays. They will also learn the skills of script and speech writing.

NEW TESTAMENT/EARLY CHURCH (.5 credit)

Dr. Charles Thaxton

Our history course will use the New Testament as an outline for the early years of this period. Students learn and write about the influence of early church martyrs and leaders.

HEALTH (.5 credit) Melody Benson

This required high school course will be approached from a biblical perspective, incorporating personal stewardship of the body and individual physical, emotional, and spiritual health.

SPEECH AND DRAMA (.5 credit)

Joanne Lee, Diane Mitchell, Kim Pollard

Students gain confidence and competence in rhetorical skills through practice in public speaking and drama. Each year students participate in a major theatrical performance. This year's play will be *A Midsummer Night's Dream: A Shakespeare Caberet*.

STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT

KONOS Academy students want to learn. Of course students aren't perfect, but we expect a heart attitude of willingness to receive instruction and to conform to our standards. Therefore, students should show up for class on time and be ready to learn. During class, we expect students to refrain from talking with one another and exhibit respect for their teachers by sitting up and being attentive. All cell phones are collected at the beginning of each day and returned at the end of the day in order to minimize distractions and maximize learning. During the week, assignments should be done thoroughly and handed in on time. We expect students (and/or parents) who are struggling to seek help from their teachers. Students need to learn fairly and honestly. Cheating (passing another's work off as their own) has no place in this community. It is a form of lying and shows lack of respect for God, teachers, learning, oneself, and others.

This community of students is a sample of real life with opportunities to practice habits of respecting one another. Obviously, this means that students should not bully or steal from each other. Less obviously, it means that students must watch how they speak to and about each other. Gossip, unfair criticism, biting sarcasm, and lying all undermine relationships. Forming friendships that exclude others (cliques) is a way of saying that some students are worth more than others. Students need to help each other; the older students especially need to set an example for the younger ones. When students disagree, we expect them to argue respectfully, "speaking the truth in love." They are to forgive and not hold grudges. We are a community of peacemakers and peacekeepers.

We also expect students to show respect for other people's property. Destroying or harming another student's or the school's property, even if accidentally, means paying for it or otherwise making restitution.

Since our bodies are a gift from God, we expect students to avoid pressuring or tempting one another sexually. We do not allow pornographic materials or immodest dress, as these degrade people made in God's image. Students shall not practice public displays of affection on KONOS property or at any KONOS events.

Likewise, we expect students to refrain from tobacco, alcohol, or other controlled substances at school and at school functions. The use or encouragement of any of these behaviors can result in expulsion. Students who struggle in any of these areas need to know that they have the freedom to talk to teachers to find help. Students help each other's weaknesses by quickly reporting hurtful behaviors. This is a way to express love.

We expect the above conduct from all of our students, both on and off campus. If your student will not conform to these standards, KONOS Academy is not a suitable place for him/her. Violations of these standards may result in disciplinary action (perhaps even expulsion). Ongoing deceit and lying to those in authority undermine trust, reveal poor character, and negatively impact the rest of the student body. If such behavior persists without any indication of repentance, disciplinary action (including possible expulsion) will follow. If a student is struggling with a part, or parts, of this code of conduct, we ask them to seek a teacher's help right away. We reserve the right to admit, deny, or dismiss any student if in the judgment of the administration the student or parents fail to comply with KONOS Academy standards. If at any time during the enrollment of your student, the school administration and student/family can no longer work together in a spirit of unity, and all reasonable avenues of communication and reconciliation have been exhausted (including the directives of Matthew 18:15-20), the student/family agrees to voluntarily withdraw from KONOS Academy.

This Code of Conduct applies to all KONOS core and KONOS *Plus* students; both on and off campus, and to all KONOS sponsored events and activities (prom, athletic events, and all other off-site events).

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What are specific class rules?

We believe in a minimum of rules, encouraging these young adults to examine their own hearts and to act in a way pleasing to the Lord. The goal is to assist them in learning. The primary method is self-discipline and self-control. If we see disobedience, disrespect, or class disruption of any kind, we will notify the parents.

1) AVOID DISTRACTIONS THAT DISRUPT ABILITY TO FOCUS

- No cell phones, laptops, or iPods are allowed in class. All cell phones are collected at the beginning of the day and returned at the end of the day. Adhere to the dress code (below) and principles of modesty. Students may not leave the campus during the school day without permission or sit in their vehicles during lunch.
- 2) NO GUM-CHEWING is allowed in class. There are two reasons for this. First, it facilitates speaking clearly. Secondly, it keeps gum from being stuck on tables and floors.
- 3) Alcohol and tobacco products are prohibited on the campus and at any KONOS sponsored activities and events. This includes parking lots and cars.
- 4) **PUNCTUALITY is expected**. Arriving late to class is very disruptive and distracting. **Please arrive at school** no later than 8:50 am.
- 5) Listen attentively and raise hand when desiring to speak during a lecture; during small group discussions, practice conversing in a way that allows each person to speak. Practice Eph. 4:29.

Is there a dress code?

With most issues, we provide form and freedom, a structure and choice within that structure. As for dress, the "form" is dress that is fitting for the occasion. We are an academic institution, preparing students to be professional. Therefore, academic/professional or "business casual" as opposed to "sports/leisurely" is appropriate dress. We trust the students and their parents to make appropriate decisions. In general, **avoid ripped jeans**, **short-shorts and short dresses (shorts should be halfway down the thigh)**, sweats, or other sloppy or immodest dress. Avoid distracting adornment (e.g., nose rings or tattoos) that distract from learning. Nose rings are not permitted. The "freedom" is the creativity of each student within proper guidelines. Parents will be notified if there are clothing issues.

Where are the classes?

Christ's Church at Whitewater (CCW), 1577 Highway 85S, Fayetteville 30215, is the location for classes (Kidlets, KK, KJ, KA, KPlus). The Carrier Center (smaller independent building) is exclusively for the KA students. The main building of CCW is for KONOS Kidlets, KK, and KJ students. Our responsibility, as good tenants and stewards, is to leave the facility as we found it (or better). Restitution for property damage will be the responsibility of the student causing the damage.

When are the classes?

KONOS Academy high school core classes are held on Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday from 9:00 - 2:45. Students should arrive for core classes (Tues./Wed./Thrs.) no later than 8:50. KONOS Kidlets, Kids, and Juniors have class from 9:15 - 2:45. See the KONOS *Plus*TM \oplus chart on page 20 for class times on Mondays and Fridays.

Do I need to fill out a Declaration of Intent to Homeschool form?

Yes, you are required to submit a Declaration of Intent every year. You may fill out the form at this link: <u>http://www.gadoe.org/Pages/Home.aspx</u>. Make a copy and submit it to Holly Hampton at KONOS at the beginning of the school year. Keep a copy for yourself. By state law, you are required to keep attendance for yourself, but do not submit monthly reports to the state or KONOS.

Is KONOS accredited?

Yes. Every course (both core and supplementary) is accredited by the Georgia Accrediting Commission (GAC). Consult with Holly Hampton (<u>hollyba749@bellsouth.net</u>) about any courses not taken under the KONOS Academy umbrella.

How is KONOS Academy tuition paid?

Tuition is due the first week of each month. Tuition received after the 10th of the month will be assessed a \$30 late fee. We strongly encourage the use of automatic payments through the web bill pay systems offered by your bank. Schedule automatic payments to KONOS with an arrival date of the 5th of the month. We also accept credit cards (Visa, M/C, Amex, Discover) for all types of payments through the KONOS website. It is important for us to receive tuition in a timely manner so we can pay our teachers in a timely manner. KONOS *Plus* course tuition will be added to your monthly statement. Deliver checks, payable to "Konos Connection," to class or send to:

You may choose to pay in advance for several months or even the whole year. A monthly statement will be issued for each family. Sarah, our administrative assistant, handles all tuition payments. Please call her at 770-632-0771 on Tuesdays or Thursdays, or email her at info@konos.org, with tuition questions.

Tuition Policy

Enrollment at KONOS Academy is purely voluntary. Your enrollment is a declaration that you have counted the cost and are willing and able to bear the obligation of paying monthly tuition and the sustaining fee.

- Early withdrawal from the core program is permitted up to October 31st with no additional tuition payment required. If a student withdraws after October 31st, payment of 50% of tuition for the remainder of the year (Nov. May) is required and may be paid monthly. Salaries and budgets have been established based on the annual commitment of our families.
- Late tuition will be assessed a late fee of \$30/month and a part of a month will constitute a whole. For example, tuition late 10 days will receive a \$30 late fee and 40 days will receive a \$60 late fee.
- Unless prior arrangements have been made with the administration, a student will not be permitted to attend class or participate in any KONOS events when tuition is delinquent beyond 60 days and payment has not been made.
- The annual sustaining fee of \$300 is payable by September 15th or in two equal payments due August 15th and January 15th. **The sustaining fee may be broken up into 10 monthly payments at your request.** Please contact Sarah Jimenez at <u>sarah@konos.org</u> to make arrangements. The tuition policy also applies to late payment of the sustaining fee.
- If tuition is in arrears beyond 90 days, the full balance of the annual tuition must be paid in full before the student can return to class. In addition, if that student returns the following year, the first four months of tuition must be paid before the school year begins.
- Any students enrolled to return to KONOS Academy must have all unpaid balances paid in full before the student will be permitted to start the new school year or participate in any KONOS athletics or events.
- Report cards and transcripts will not be released until tuition is paid in full.

Does Konos offer tuition assistance?

Yes, KONOS Academy is able to offer tuition assistance to students through the Education Expense Tax Credit law (HB 1133). Assistance is the result of taxpayer participation (that includes you!) and cooperation with Georgia GOAL, a student scholarship organization that partners with KONOS. <u>Eligibility must be established in a student's</u> first year of enrollment in the core program at KONOS Academy (KONOS *Plus only* students are not eligible for assistance). For further information, please contact John Lee at john@konos.org.

Families that solicit donations to KONOS Academy from corporate sponsors also have the opportunity to have 50% of the donation applied to their tuition balance.

How do I enroll in and pay for Monday KONOS *Plus*[™] ⊕ courses?

1. For specific questions about courses, please contact the teacher directly. Email addresses may be found on the website under "Faculty."

- 2. You may enroll in any KONOS *Plus*[™] ⊕ course online at <u>www.konos.org</u>. An application can also be printed off and mailed into KONOS. Most of the *Plus* classes are held on Monday.
- 3. If a course has not met its minimum requirement of students, the registration fee will be refunded.
- 4. The course teacher will contact each student directly about location, time, materials, etc.
- 5. Each teacher arranges for purchase and distribution of materials. The parents may be instructed to purchase a textbook from a recommended source, or the teacher may supply materials during the first day of class and collect a fee directly from the parents.
- 6. Tuition is paid monthly by the first day of class. Checks are made payable to KONOS. The monthly tuition for KONOS *Plus*[™] ⊕ classes may be added to the KONOS core tuition check. The most preferable mode of payment is by mail or by direct deposit from the parents' bank.
- 7. Withdrawal from a KONOS *Plus* course before October 16th is permitted with no further obligation for remaining tuition payments (October tuition is required if drop request is after Oct 2nd). <u>Parents must notify the Konos Plus teacher directly</u>. After October 16th, the withdrawing family is responsible for 50% of the remaining tuition payments for the school year. <u>All parents should consult with the Konos Plus teacher before withdrawing</u>. The administration will drop a student from a class only after receiving confirmation from the teacher to proceed.
- 8. Questions about tuition should be directed to Sarah Jimenez at <u>sarah@konos.org</u> (email is best) or at 770-632-0771 on Tuesdays or Thursdays. A monthly email statement will be sent to the parents.

How are grades reported?

Tests are given periodically (short essay, long essay, matching, multiple choice, impromptu speeches, open-book tests) with an exam at the end of each semester. At the end of the first semester (end of January) families will receive semester report cards by email. At the end of the second semester (end of May) families will receive report cards mailed to the home address. The state of Georgia records grades by semester and determines the GPA and HOPE qualification based upon semester grades. Grades are listed on Gradelink (see "How to Use Gradelink").

How do I use Gradelink?

- 1. If your student was enrolled in KONOS Academy last year and you already have a username and password, you will be able to use the same again this year.
- 2. If you are new to KONOS Academy or are logging into Gradelink for the first time, you will need your unique student code. This code will be emailed to the parents.
- 3. To login for the first time, go to <u>www.gradelink.com</u>.
- 4. The school code for Konos Academy is 1600.
- 5. You will receive separate login information for each student different from the parents.
- 6. In the parents' login, you will be able to see all of your children's grades within one account.
- 7. After you have used the login information provided for you, you can go to "My Account" and change your password to one you can remember.
- 8. If you would like an app on your phone, the same login information will be used for both.
- 9. Once you are logged into Gradelink, the parents can toggle between children. Each will have a list of classes they are registered for.
- 10. If you go to Assignments, you can see what grades they received in each class in each assignment. **Grades** will be updated on a weekly basis for all Academy classes. Or go to grades, and you can see a general overview of how they are doing.

Grading Policies

- 1. **LATE WORK:** Work that is turned in late *with parental excuse*, because of an absence or other extenuating circumstances, will be accepted. However, we discourage parents from allowing their student(s) to consistently turn work in late. Timeliness and the ability to meet deadlines are important life skills, and consistent lateness fails to foster these characteristics.
 - a. An assignment can be accepted late *only* if the student has a note from the parent that is received by the teacher before the assignment is due. Notes written by parents *after* the assignment was due are *not* accepted.

- b. Late work must be turned in within 1 week of the original due date, or a 0 will automatically be given.
- 2. MISSING WORK: Assignments, quizzes, tests, etc. that are not turned in at the time they are due will be marked as 0 in Gradelink. We have a no-tolerance unexcused lateness policy, which will be strictly enforced this year. Students will not be notified of assignments that are missing. There will be no opportunities to turn in missing work later in the semester.
- 3. **PREPARATION AND PARTICIPATION:** In addition to quiz and test scores, student preparation and participation are also factored into the student's grade. Teachers will evaluate the student's level of participation and preparation, including the following areas:
 - a. Does the student come prepared with assigned books?
 - b. Does the student come to class with completed assignments (reading, How to Read A Book, and study guides)?
 - c. Does the student complete assigned pages in workbooks?
 - d. Does the student participate in class discussions well? Poorly? Eagerly or silently?
 - e. Is the student disruptive and lacking self-control or engaged and attentive?

Final grades on report cards and transcripts shall not exceed 100%.

Participation in the sports program requires an overall average of 75% in all classes and a student must have a passing average in all classes.

What is the policy on plagiarism?

The following constitute plagiarism:

- Copying the work of another student and passing it off as your own.
- Copying sentences and paragraphs from books or the internet without citing sources and presenting the work as your own.
- Copying sentences and paragraphs, word-for-word, from a source without giving credit or citing the source.
- Using content from other sources (sentences, paragraph, or paragraphs) where the thoughts are the same as the source but words are moved around or substituted just enough to make it look like you didn't plagiarize.

The following will raise a red flag and look like plagiarism:

- Copying word-for-word (the most obvious offense).
- Using the same stream of thought sentence after sentence with minor word substitution.
- Using the same phrases as the source with little variation.
- Using the same content, facts, references, as the source as you move from paragraph 1 to paragraph 2 to paragraph 3, etc.

The plagiarism policy:

First offense – Zero on the assignment

Second offense – Zero on the assignment, one-week suspension from school, and zeros on all assignments, quizzes, and tests that week.

Third offense – expelled from school. Plagiarism is lying and stealing and repeated offenses reveal a lack of integrity and character that damages trust and does great harm. It cannot be tolerated.

What if I'm absent?

• Unexpected Illness or Event: Notify Mr. Lee by email if you will be out of class. Deliver the completed assignments to class, if possible. Appoint a student to deliver the current week's folder with assignments, if

possible. If absent, you will receive the week's assignments, parent letter, missed quizzes, hand-outs, etc. by email Thursday. Parents are expected to proctor those take-home tests. The student is responsible to make up this work within one week. When the student returns to class, put quizzes or tests in a sealed envelope (if you have not emailed them to the teacher of record) and other homework in the student folder. Any missed or late work not previously excused will receive a 0. Any work received later than one week after an absence will receive a 0 on that assignment, quiz, or test.

• **Planned absence:** Notify Mr. Lee of planned vacations or events. Regular policy applies (see above) except for writing projects (research papers, etc.) that are extended and have had due dates published well in advance of the absence. The student is still responsible to turn in writing assignments on the assignment due date or before and should coordinate with the writing teachers.

What is the illness policy?

Please keep your student home if he or she appears ill and could spread illness to others. We also ask that you keep your student home from school for at least 24 hours after running a temperature, vomiting, or having diarrhea. If they run a fever during the school day, parents will be contacted to come pick up their student as soon as possible. If they have been diagnosed with strep, then they must take their antibiotic for 24 hours before returning.

A student absent due to a contagious disease must be confirmed non-contagious before returning to classes. The following guidelines apply:

- *Chicken Pox* Exclude 7 days, or have a doctor's permit to reenterschool.
- *Diphtheria* Have doctor's permit to reenterschool.
- Impetigo Have doctor's permit to reenter school, or wait until all sores are well.
- *Head Lice* Exclude for at least 24 hours, and until the child's hair has been treated so there are no longer lice or eggs (nits) present, *or* the parents provide a written statement from a physician verifying that the child is no longer contagious. All treated students will be rechecked upon their return; if any live lice are found, the exclusion procedure will begin again.
- *Measles* Have doctor's permit to reenter school, or until rash is gone.
- *German Measles* No restrictions.
- *Meningitis* (Epidemic Type) Have doctor's permit to reenter school. Family contacts are not to return to school without doctor's permit.
- *Mononucleosis* Have doctor's permit to reenter school, or exclude until free of symptoms.
- *Mumps* Have doctor's permit to reenter school, or wait until all swelling is gone.
- *Pink Eye* Have doctor's permit to reenter school, or until eyes are clear.
- *Ringworm of the Scalp* May attend school with doctor's permit following prescribed treatment and must have ringworm covered by cap.
- *Ringworm of the Skin* May attend school with doctor's permit following prescribed treatment and must have area covered.
- *Streptococcal* infections (Strep Throat and Scarlet Fever) Have doctor's permit to reenter school or exclude until free of symptoms.
- *Staph* Infections Have medical doctor's permit to reenter school or exclude until free of symptoms.
- *Tuberculosis* Have doctor's permit to reenterschool.
- *Whooping Cough* Have doctor's permit to reenter school, or exclude until free of cough (usually 3 to 5 weeks).

Students enrolled in Konos Academy or who seek to enroll in Konos Academy, who are diagnosed to be carrying any serious and continuing communicable or potentially lethal disease, shall be denied admission, dismissed from the School, or excluded indefinitely from classes. They will not be permitted to enroll or reenroll until they have been diagnosed by a Medical Doctor (MD) as no longer carrying the communicable disease. This policy is to apply to diseases such as, but not limited to, Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome (AIDS). Students who test positive for antibodies of Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) or who are infected with AIDS Related Complex (ARC) are included in this policy.

The administration reserves the right to make any decisions it deems prudent for the health and safety of the whole student body. The general guidelines above will be followed unless, in the judgment of the administration, circumstances call for a different course of action.

Can an assignment be excused?

Assignments may not be arbitrarily excused. All students are responsible for assigned work and tests. If there is a death in the family or extreme family emergency that prohibits the completion of work, contact the course teacher to discuss the handling of work in question. Even if an assignment is excused, the student is still responsible to make up any work that might appear on a future test in order to receive credit for the course. Any unexcused work will receive a zero.

What is an honors student?

All students take the basic core courses and do the weekly assignments. Honors students (typically 11th and 12th graders) will be given additional work. These courses are designated on their report cards as "Honors." Students are placed by grade levels in the literature and writing classes according to grade and proficiency level. If you prefer your 9th-10th grader to be given advanced work or your 11th-12th grader to be given only basic work, please inform us by e-mail before the first day of class.

Konos Four-Year High School policy

The high school experience at KONOS Academy will consist of only 4 years, in compliance with the Georgia Department of Education which states:

"9th grade officially begins the Fall of the student's 9th grade year.

The 12th grade year concludes at the end of the spring term after four years of enrollment beginning in the 9th grade."

Some courses taken in 8th grade may count towards high school credit. Those courses include: Algebra I, Physical Science, and the first year of a foreign language. English, history, and electives taken prior to 9th grade will not be counted. *No course taken in 7th grade will be counted toward the high school requirements unless approved by the administration.*

Does KONOS have a graduation policy?

Beginning with the 2019-20 graduating class, students desiring to graduate with KONOS Academy must complete the four-year history cycle in the Academy, in good standing. Seniors have the option of enrolling in history only (option not open to freshmen, sophomores, and juniors). If a student desires to dual enroll during his/her junior/senior year and *not* enroll at KONOS, he/she will not be eligible to participate in the KONOS graduation ceremony. Students enrolled *only* in KONOS *Plus*TM \bigoplus Courses are **not** eligible to participate in the graduation ceremonies of KONOS or receive a KONOS transcript.

Note: The 2018-19 senior class is the last class that qualified to be grandfathered under previous policy and may graduate with KONOS Academy if they have not attended KONOS their senior year. Those students must have completed at lease their sophomore and junior years at KONOS.

Who is eligible for valedictorian and salutatorian?

Students who have been enrolled in KONOS Academy for all four years and taken all of the core curriculum classes (including electives) are eligible for consideration as valedictorian or salutatorian. This is necessary for a fair, "apples to apples," comparison among qualifying candidates. Additional academic awards and designations (e.g. graduation medallion, honor cords, etc.) are also based on the inclusion of all core and elective courses taken at KONOS. Core students who have <u>not</u> been enrolled in all four years and all classes are not eligible. Note: The KONOS Plus classes are *not* core classes are *not* included in valedictorian and salutatorian calculations.

What is an associate student?

An associate student has completed his/her sophomore and junior years at KONOS Academy but has not enrolled for his/her senior year. If this student desires to graduate with KONOS Academy, he/she will be considered an associate

student. The associate student fee is \$150 and is due the first week of school (Sept. 5th). Associate students are not eligible for consideration as valedictorian or salutatorian since they will not have completed the same academic material as those students who completed their senior year with KONOS Academy. **2018-19 is the final year that KONOS will have associate students. Thereafter, all students will be considered to be full-time students.**

Does KONOS provide transcripts?

Beginning in 2019-20, KONOS will provide (included as part of tuition) college counseling and an accredited KONOS transcript for every core student. The cost, previously a separate fee, will be added to tuition. All KONOS courses (core, Konos *Plus*, and electives) will be listed on the transcript and none may be deleted. Families may forego a KONOS transcript if they desire to do their own transcript.

Does KONOS have an I.E.P. (individual education plan) policy?

Due to limited financial resources and staffing, KONOS Academy is not equipped to address special needs and individual education plans. However, the administration reserves the right to extend assistance to students. **IEP testing policy**: All proctored quizzes/exams must be taken the same day as the rest of class and returned (scanned and emailed) the same day. This is mandatory to maintain the integrity of the testing process.

Does KONOS have an honor society?

Yes! The purpose of Eta Sigma Alpha National Home School Honor Society shall be to recognize and encourage scholarship among home school students. To achieve this purpose, Eta Sigma Alpha National Home School Honor Society shall provide opportunities for the development of an intellectual climate that will stimulate the exchange of ideas and ideals, foster scholarship, and promote academic excellence. Eta Sigma Alpha shall also advocate homeschooling as a viable and successful educational methodology and act as a liaison for homeschooling to the general public, colleges/universities, and the media. For national membership, students must score above the 90 percentile on a standardized or college placement exam and have a GPA of 3.5 or above. How much time is spent at home with assignments?

Students in the core program will spend 10-15 hours at home on their given assignments. Of course, students who read faster will spend less time, and those who type faster will be at an advantage. A good rule of thumb with the one-day classes is to spend at least the class time for four days. For example, for a one-hour literature class, spend at least one hour per day reading and answering study guide questions. The same is true for history, government, and other reading courses. For skill-building classes like grammar and vocabulary about one hour together, including memorizing and study. For writing, it varies depending upon the student's confidence, the complexity of the assignment, and the motivation of the student. Each of the following days is an 8-hour workday. With a lunch break and an afternoon break, that leaves plenty of time per day to finish work and still have free time. Of course, students competing in sports or speech and debate tournaments will have to work harder and spend more time in practice. The following is a <u>sample</u> schedule for a Tuesday student working eight (8) hours/day. Each student's schedule and routine will vary according the unique personality, ability, and work habit of the student.

How much parent involvement is required?

Successful students need to be "walked through" the program. On Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday evening, parents and teen meet to plan the week ahead. Assignments are written in a student planner. A rigid daily schedule is planned (first work, then eat, then work, then play). At the end of each day, students show their completed work. Before the weekend, written material is submitted to the parent for review. The day before class is for refinement and study. Also before class, the parent reviews all the work to be sure it is completed and of sufficient quality to be handed in. For juniors and seniors, it is expected that they have already learned how to discipline themselves. Usually a more hands-off approach works best for these older teens. Discuss with the student a general schedule for each week and then let him/her try it. How would he/she like to arrange his/her time? Try it and adjust periodically as needed. Parent volunteers are needed throughout the year for the play and other special events.

What materials are needed?

For the one-day core courses, KONOS Academy purchases books and workbooks for each student from the materials fee. These are handed out during Orientation. KONOS $Plus \to \Theta$ course teachers will instruct on individual materials for that class and will contact their students directly. Core students are responsible for a backpack, lunch bag, water bottle, three-ring binder for assignment sheets and history notes, college-ruled notebook paper, 5 tab dividers, a pencil box or zippered bag containing two pencils with erasers, two black or blue pens, one red pen, a pencil sharpener, and a highlighter. On the assignment sheet, there is a list of specific books and other supplies to bring to the next week's class. Students' grades are marked down when they fail to bring required books to school.

Do students bring their own lunches?

Students may bring their own lunch and a snack to class. They also may order lunch each week when the athletic teams offer lunch as a fundraiser. A refrigerator and microwaves will be available to the students. Students are encouraged, though, to bring bottled water to keep at their desk all day. Keeping food at tables and snacking through class time is distracting to the teacher and other students, and is not permitted. Snacks should be eaten at the appointed break and lunchtime.

How do we stay in touch?

Communication is important. We want to answer questions and discuss concerns. *Teacher/class questions should be directed to the respective course teacher and contact information is on the KONOS website (konos.org) or in the KONOS Academy Directory*. The best way to contact John Lee is by email – john@konos.org. Mr. Lee will respond as soon as possible. You can also phone 678-283-4755 and leave a message if he is not available. We (KA, KJ, KK) send a parent letter each week. Please read the previous week's assignment sheet, the parent letter, and the next week's assignment sheet to stay informed about what we're accomplishing in class and how your son/daughter is doing. Each KONOS *Plus*TM \oplus teacher will communicate with you and let you know how best to contact him/her.

We also want to communicate with you and will do so primarily through email. Please be diligent to read all email communication so you don't miss important information. Families are responsible for all email communication that is not kicked back to KONOS for technical and/or server issues.

Who do I contact in an emergency?

If you need to contact your student during a class, please call the cell phone of the head teacher, not the student. Teachers' contact numbers appear in the directory. For KA students, call John Lee at 678-283-4755. If John Lee is unavailable, please call Joanne Lee at 678-283-4753.

How do we apply for next year?

Several reminders are sent home in the parent letters, beginning in January, strongly encouraging currently enrolled students and siblings to register online *before* our information meeting in the beginning of March. Enrolling online before the information meeting secures and reserves the student's place in their existing class day. Failure to enroll before the information meeting in March will result in loss of seniority status. After the information meeting, several factors are considered in assigning class days, and the administration reserves the right to place students in the day it deems best.

Why doesn't KONOS observe the same holidays as the public schools?

KONOS does not follow the public school calendar exactly and does not observe all of the same holidays as the public school system. While much of our holiday schedule is consistent with the public school calendar, Columbus Day, Martin Luther King Day, and Presidents' Day are not observed by KONOS because each of these holidays falls on a Monday and presents a conflict with our KONOS *Plus* class schedule and instruction requirements. Since we only meet on Mondays for KONOS *Plus* classes, we cannot observe every public holiday. Students may elect to observe the above holidays, but they will be responsible for all missed work and exams. The Konos calendar may be viewed on the website.
